DR. GAYBRIELLE JONES-MASON

As a young child, my father Rev. P.W. Jones was the preacher at Nicholas Temple AME Church. During the 80's, Nicholas Temple was located in the middle of the income based housing community referred to as "The Brick Yard". They called it the "The Brick Yard" because for several blocks in Ensley all you could see was small two story structures of red brick. For at least three years, our family worship and served the Ensley area.

As time went on my father was placed in other AME Churches. However, my oldest brother and I attended/graduated from Ensley High School (EHS). While matriculating academically at EHS, I played two instruments in the band, served as an SGA officer, and a proud member of the Drama Club, which was headed by my mentor Mrs. Yolaine Sykes. It is because of Mrs. Sykes that I found my way to a full scholarship in theatre at Grambling State University. During my tenure at Ensley, I learned several integral skills, which have guided and nurtured me.

I had role models such as Dr. Hines, who was then my EHS principal and now BCS Instructional Superintendent. Ensley High School was also home to the young mothers program. Real life exposure to teen pregnancy, gang activity and violence against one another motivated me. I began to have intrinsic motivation towards making decisions, work ethic, studying skills and my future. Lastly, Ensley High School taught me pride. At such a pivotal point in my life, Ensley High School gave me the tools needed to be a successful individual, role model to others and ultimately Dr. Gaybrielle Jones-Mason, EdD.
